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Snow Scenes Around Birchington

The recent few mild winters we have experienced has spoilt us into thinking that snow and ice were scenes from the past. Birchington is generally blessed with warmer winters and cooler summers than other inland areas, although this year we have had our fair share of snow.

In our archives there are several snow scene photographs, some showing exceptional times when even the sea was frozen over as far as the eye could see.

In about 1940 the frozen sea was captured on film. In the background the Bay Hotel is visible with its Uncle Tom's Cabin bar, much remembered by locals and visitors alike. The hotel has made way to the three blocks of flats which are now a prominent feature of the Minnis Bay skyline.

So cold was the winter of 1963 the sea around the Isle of Thanet became frozen, forming ice flows. When the tide was out, large blocks of tightly packed ice were left resting on the beach at Minnis Bay, in places up to four or five feet high. The Margate lifeboat was unable to launch since over nine inches of solid ice blocked the slipway, fortunately there were no calls to launch. The sea remained flat calm for several days.





Late afternoon and evening of Friday 7th of February 1969 a heavy snow storm blanketed the area. By ten o'clock most roads became impassable with deep snow drifts, some up to ten feet high, blocking most roads. Many hundreds of travellers were stranded either at work, sporting events or weekend revellers were unable to get home. There were reports from that night of many heroic deeds, acts of kindness and shelter being offered to complete strangers. All public and private transport ground to a halt, some districts lost power supplies and telephones.


Seeboard engineers had to walk three miles to restore power to Minster. Over eighty guests including Mr. Ted Heath attending the Broadstairs Sailing Club annual dinner were stranded at the Walpole Bay Hotel. A stranded bus near Brooksend Hill, Birchington was used as sanctuary for numerous motorists stranded in that area.

Some motorists tried to use the adjacent field to avoid the snowbound Brooksend Hill however they soon became stuck.

The last time the editor has been credited arranging anything romantic. We got engaged!




Neame Woods 25th December 1970

Since our last edition, we have been fortunate to have been given some photographs of the "Guy Fawkes Trial" held in the early nineteen During those austere times of post war fifties. Britain the community of Birchington made its own fun, this event being one example. The editor can remember these evenings clearly, although only through the eyes of a child. When following the procession the most difficult part was attempting to avoid all the potholes, along Albion Road which then was unmade and poorly lit by a few gas lights. The bonfires were first held on the hedge enclosed cliff top area where previously there was a pig sty and is now a grass area. A bonfire was built in the field where the Ocean Close Estate is now built and finally along the western side of Epple Bay Avenue where there were some partly built bungalows.
